QUALIFIED PERSONS ADVICE

The Local Government Act 1993 Section 65 provides as follows:

- (1) A general manager must ensure that any advice, information or recommendation given to the council or a council committee is given by a person who has the qualifications or experience necessary to give such advice, information or recommendation.
- (2) A council or council committee is not to decide on any matter which requires the advice of a qualified person without considering such advice unless
 - (a) the general manager certifies, in writing
 - (i) that such advice was obtained; and
 - (ii) that the general manager took the advice into account in providing general advice to the council or council committee;

and

(b) a copy of that advice or, if the advice was given orally, a written transcript or summary of that advice is provided to the council or council committee with the general manager's certificate.

I therefore certify that with respect to all advice, information or recommendation provided to the Council in or with this Agenda:

- i) the advice, information or recommendation is given by a person who has the qualifications or experience necessary to give such advice, information or recommendation; and
- ii) where any advice is directly given by a person who does not have the required qualifications or experience, that person has obtained and taken into account in that person's general advice, the advice from an appropriately qualified or experienced person.

LIVESTREAMING AND RECORDING OF COUNCIL MEETINGS

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Closed Council Meetings will not be live streamed or recorded.

A copy of the recording of the meeting will be placed on Council's website as soon as practicable after the meeting, the Closed Council session of the meeting will be redacted.

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In addition to the Live Streaming Policy, Council is to audio record meetings to assist Council officers in the preparation of minutes of proceedings.

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- only applies to formal Council meetings (ordinary meetings, special meetings and Annual General meetings);
- does not apply to closed sessions of Council;
- does not apply to Committees of Council;
- the recording will not replace written minutes and a transcript of the recording will not be prepared by Council;
- the recording may be used by Council staff to assist with the preparation of the minutes;
- the minutes of a meeting, once confirmed by Council, prevail over the audio recording of the meeting;

GUIDELINES FOR COUNCIL MEETINGS

EXPECTATIONS OF COUNCILLOR CONDUCT

- The Code of Conduct for Elected Members Policy sets out the standards of behaviour expected of Councillors with respect to all aspects of their role, including the following:
 - Councillors acknowledge the importance of high standards of behaviour in maintaining good governance and therefore agree to conduct themselves in accordance with the standards of behaviour set out in the Policy;
 - Councillors are to be respectful in their conduct, communication and relationships with members of the community, fellow
 Councillors and Council employees in a way which builds trust and confidence in Council;
 - Councillors' actions must not bring the Council or the office of a Councillor into disrepute;
 - Councillors must treat all persons fairly, must not cause any reasonable person offence or embarrassment, and must not bully or harass any person;
 - Councillors must listen to, and respect, the views of other Councillors in Council meetings, and endeavor to ensure that issues, not
 personalities, are the focus of debate;
 - Councillors must show respect when expressing personal views publicly and the personal conduct of a Councillor must not reflect, or have the potential to reflect, adversely on the reputation of the Council;
- Pursuant to section 28(3)(a) of the *Local Government Act 1993*, Councillors must not direct or attempt to direct an employee of the council in relation to the discharge of the employee's duties;
- Pursuant to section 40 of the Local Government Act 1993, the chairperson may suspend a councillor from part or all of the meeting if the
 councillor makes a personal reflection about another councillor or an employee of the council and refuses to apologise; or interjects
 repeatedly; or disrupts the meeting and disobeys a call to order by the chairperson.

MEETING CONDUCT

- People attending Council Meetings are expected to behave in an appropriate manner.
- The following is not acceptable:
 - Offensive or inappropriate behaviour;
 - Personal insults; and
 - Verbal abuse.
- Pursuant to section 41 of the Local Government Act 1993, it is an offence if a member of the public hinders or disrupts a council meeting.
- In the case of any inappropriate outburst or derogatory behaviour, an apology from the offending party or parties will be requested. Anyone at the meeting, if they feel offended in any way by any such behaviour specified above, should immediately bring the behaviour to the notice of the Chairperson by the way of a Point of Order.
- The Chairperson has the right to evict from a meeting any person who is not behaving to an appropriate standard.

PUBLIC QUESTIONS AND STATEMENTS

Regulation 36 of the Local Government (Meeting Procedures) Regulations 2025 relates to the provision of Public Question Time during a Council meeting. Regulation 36(3) of the Regulations stipulate that "a Council is to determine any other procedures to be followed in respect of public question time at an ordinary council meeting."

Public question time is to commence at approximately 5.30pm and is to be conducted in accordance with the following guidelines:

- At each Council Meeting, up to 20 minutes, or such longer period as Council may determine by resolution at that meeting, is to be provided for persons at the meeting to ask questions.
- A person seeking to ask a question must firstly identify himself or herself by stating their name and the town they reside in.
- If more than one person wishes to ask a question, the Mayor is to determine the order in which those questions are asked.
- Questions must be directed to the Mayor who shall answer or direct the question to the appropriate Councillor or Council Officer. A question
 will be answered if the information is known otherwise taken on notice and responded to in writing within 10 working days. Questions
 should preferably be in writing and provided to the General Manager at the Council Meeting.
- A person is entitled to ask no more than two questions on any specific subject. If a person has up to two questions on several subjects, the Mayor may defer those questions until other questions have been asked and refer back to that person only if time permits.
- Each speaker is limited to a maximum of 3 minutes.

REPRESENTATIONS ON PLANNING ITEMS

A maximum of four persons per item (two for and two against) will be permitted to address Council on a planning item. After the representation has been made, Councillors are permitted to ask questions of the party who made the representation.

PETITIONS

Part 6, Division 1 of the *Local Government Act 1993* refers to the presentation of a petition to Council. Council is to treat any petition received in accordance with the provisions of the *Local Government Act 1993*.

Councillor Terrett believed that the Minutes from the 18 August 2025 meeting were incorrect as previous Minute No. 23/095 had not been rescinded. Confirmation of the Minutes was deferred.

Council RESOLVED that the confirmation of the Open Council Minutes of the Ordinary Meeting of the Northern Midlands Council held at the Council Chambers, Longford on Monday, 18 August 2025, be deferred until the next Council Meeting.

2 OFFICER'S COMMENTS

There is no conflict between the 2023 and 2025 Council decisions. The 2023 motion required revisiting JMG's Option 2, not implementing it, and only called for a timeline if the option was approved. The option was not approved.

The 2025 meeting revisited the option, considered updated information, and Council chose not to proceed. This fulfilled the intent of the 2023 decision, therefore there is no rescission or overturning and the 2025 motion does not trigger Regulation 22.

5.3.1 Notice Of Motion: Recruitment Of Community Services Manager / Division

Responsible Officer: Maree Bricknell, Acting General Manager

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

That Council, in accordance with its Workforce Plan, prepare a prioritised list of proposed new staff positions, with the addition of a Community Services Manager/Department and the associated costings, for consideration during the 2026/2027 Council budget deliberations.

Councillor Terrett has requested the below Notice of Motion be included in the Agenda for the Council Meeting to be held on 20 October 2025.

NOTICE OF MOTION

That Council direct the General Manager to recruit a Community Services Manager. The job description should include among other things, the development and implementation of key strategies. The first five local community strategies are:

- Arts and Culture Strategy
- Communications & Engagement Strategy
- Economic Development Strategy
- Health and Wellbeing Strategy
- Youth Strategy
- Council's Health and Wellbeing Strategy.

Background

Northern Midlands Council does not have a Community Services Manager or a dedicated Community Services Division to deliver strategic programs such as Seniors Week activities. Further, the absence of Neighbourhood Houses in the Northern Midlands and Health Promotion staff at the Longford Community Health Centre prevents collaborative approaches being taken to community development programs and activities.

The Health and Wellbeing Strategy 2024 was supported by Council, following community consultation, to take strategic initiatives, including the Disability Action Plan, Positive Ageing Plan, and Domestic and Family Violence Strategy, Healthy Northern Midlands Program. Without proactive steps being taken these strategies will never be realised.

In response to questions on notice, Council was advised that Council does not currently have a Community Services Manager or a dedicated Community Services Division. Current staff resources are limited. While some proactive steps have been taken council has been limited in expanding a responsible and community-focused approach.

Local Government and Northern Midlands Council is more than roads, rates and rubbish, and should also be about building communities and addressing community needs.

OFFICER COMMENTS

At the 22 April 2024 Council Meeting, the following community strategies were endorsed:



- Art and Culture Strategy 2024
- Communication and Engagement Strategy 2024
- Economic Development Strategy 2024
- Health and Wellbeing Strategy 2024
- Youth Strategy 2024.

The development of further strategies including a Domestic and Family Violence Strategy, Disability Inclusion Strategy, Positive Ageing Strategy and Reconciliation Strategy was flagged. To date these have not progressed past preliminary drafts due to staff resource limitations.

The implementation of the schedule of strategic projects associated with each of the endorsed Community Strategies has been driven by staff in Governance and Corporate Services. The progress achieved across 2024 was reported in Council's 2023/2024 Annual Report.

The progress achieved in the following twelve months will be reported in Council's 2024/2025 Annual Report.

Additional staffing resources would enable the implementation of the endorsed five strategies to be expedited, and the additional strategies progressed.

It has been proposed that the position of Community Services Manager be created to drive this strategic work, and the broader Council community development agenda. The annual cost of such a department with two staff has been estimated as \$0.5M.

Should Council approve additional staff funding in a forthcoming Council budget, it would need to be determined what the priorities are for expanding Council's staffing contingency: i.e. is the creation of a Community Services Manager of greater priority than other new positions eg. Engineer, Emergency and Recovery Officer, GIS Officer, Asset Manager, Neighbourhood House Co-ordinator etc?

7 COUNCIL COMMITTEES - RECOMMENDATIONS

7.1 EVANDALE DISTRICT COMMITTEE

At the ordinary meeting of the Evandale District Committee held on 7 October 2025 the following motions were recorded for Council's consideration:

7.1.1 Pioneer Park - Presentation For Sequencing Of Works

•

Officer Recommendation:

That Council notes the committee's request and refers them to the decision at the September 2025 Council meeting.

Committee Recommendation:

That Council arrange a dedicated workshop and presentation for the committee to review, discuss and understand the proposed sequencing of works under the Pioneer Park Landscape Master Plan, including staging priorities, timelines, and funding options, prior to commencement of implementation.

Officer Comment:

This matter was considered the September 2025 meeting.

Background:

- Project initiation & concept development (2022–2023): Council engaged Lange Design (with Loop Architecture) to
 develop a Master Plan for Pioneer Park; a draft site analysis was presented to the Evandale Advisory Committee
 (EAC) in early 2023 to inform the preliminary plan.
- In-principle acceptance & public exhibition (20 May 2024): Council resolved to accept in principle the preliminary
 Pioneer Park Master Plan and release it for public comment; Council also resolved to consider funding minor works
 in future budgets and to seek external grants for full implementation.
- Community consultation (Aug 2024): The plan was exhibited across August 2024 (on display locally and online); submissions were collated and provided to the consultant.
- Consultant response & final plan (Dec 2024 Jan 2025): Lange Design provided a consolidated response to submissions and updated the plan; on 20 January 2025, Council accepted the finalised Pioneer Park Landscape Master Plan and reaffirmed the intent to seek grants and consider minor works in future budgets (Minute No. 25/0026).
- The Evandale District Committee emphasised maintaining the heritage integrity of the park during consultation and subsequent correspondence.
- Community representatives also asked about further opportunities to discuss staging as works progress, indicating a desire for clarity on timing and priorities.



7.1.2 Speed Reduction In Evandale Shopping Precinct: 40Km/Hr Zone

Officer Recommendation:

That Council supports in principle the reduction of the posted speed limit subject to additional investigation.

Committee Recommendation:

The committee requests that Council reviews the safety risks within the Evandale shopping precinct arising from its narrow carriageway and verges, high pedestrian activity (including children, older persons, mobility-scooter users, and cyclists), and the need to protect the township's historic streetscape and infrastructure and;

- Supports in principle the reduction of the posted speed limit from 50 km/h to 40 km/h within the Evandale shopping precinct, defined for the purposes of this motion as; Russell Street between High Street and Macquarie Street.
- 2. Engages with local traders and residents to **c**onfirm precinct boundaries, staging, and a communications plan (including event overlays such as the Penny Farthing weekend).

Officer Comment:

Any changes to speed limits need to be directed by the Department of State Growth. There will be a need to engage a traffic engineer for a desktop review.

Background:

Road environment and vulnerable users: Evandale's main street functions as a high pedestrian activity area with constrained widths, historic fabric, frequent visitor activity and mobility scooter users. Reducing from 50 to 40 km/h materially lowers kinetic energy in any conflict and improves driver reaction margins at crossing points. There are safety risks within the Evandale shopping precinct arising from its narrow carriageway and verges, high pedestrian activity (including children, older persons, mobility-scooter users, and cyclists), and the need to protect the township's historic streetscape and infrastructure.

7.1.3 Heavy Vehicle Access Along Rodgers Lane And Murray Street To Macquarie Street

Officer Recommendation:

That Council notes the recommendation and directs officers to investigate the issue.

Committee Recommendation:

That Council notes the road safety risk associated with heavy vehicle turning movements from Rodgers Lane into Macquarie Street due to the constrained carriageway width and turning geometry, and the conflict created when trucks swing into the oncoming traffic lane at this location.

Officer Comment:

Officer investigation will need to be conducted. Traffic counters can be installed to engage what vehicles are using these roads

Background:

Rodgers Lane is very narrow; when heavy vehicles enter Macquarie Street their turning path encroaches into the opposing traffic lane, creating an avoidable safety risk and amenity impacts for the Evandale town centre.



7.1.4 Evandale Restriction Of Parking – Rodgers Lane To Murray Street On Sundays

Officer Recommendation:

That Council notes the recommendation and directs officers to investigate the issue.

Committee Recommendation:

The committee requests the council to restrict parking to "No Standing" zones along Rodgers Lane to Murray Street on Sundays and install appropriate signage to clearly indicate the "No Standing" restriction for the designated area.

Officer Comment:

Further investigation needs to be conducted in this area. There has previously been signage installed.

Background:

The section of Rodgers Lane to Murray Street experiences significant congestion on Sundays due to increased visitor traffic. This creates safety concerns for pedestrians and obstructs emergency vehicle access. Implementing a "No Standing" restriction will:

- Improve traffic flow and reduce bottlenecks.
- Enhance pedestrian safety.
- Similar measures have been successfully applied in other areas, such as Coachmans Road and Saddlers Court, following community consultation and Council resolution.



7.2 LONGFORD DISTRICT COMMITTEE

At the ordinary meetings of the Longford Local District Committee held on 3 September 2025 and 1 October 2025 the following motions were recorded for Council's consideration:

7.2.1 Illawarra Road Scenic Road Corridor - Mural

Officer Recommendation:

That Council notes the committee's recommendation and seek initial advice from Department of State Growth.

Committee Recommendation:

The Longford District Committee requests Council to write to Mr Hugh MacKinnon at "Mountford" to ask for permission to create a racing mural on the Water Tower, situated Illawarra Road, to commemorate the Longford Motor Racing History for the town.

Officer Comment:

Initial advice to be sought for the feasibility of the proposed community mural on Illawarra Road Water Tower.

Background:

Department of State Growth initial investigation to determine if the mural would be advisable/acceptable on the highway. Before proceeding, Council seeks State Growth's advice on any requirements, approvals, or conditions that may apply given the structure's proximity and visibility to the state road network.

7.2.2 Longford Odour

Officer Recommendation:

That Council acknowledges the community's ongoing concerns regarding the intermittent odour in Longford and supports an engagement with the EPA, JBS, TasWater, and other stakeholders.

Committee Recommendation:

"The Longford District Committee requests that Northern Midland Council write to the EPA, copying all Lyons MPs, The Minister and Shadow Minister for Environment and Member for McIntyre, asking that the EPA launch a formal investigation into the source of the ongoing unacceptable intermittent odour in Longford known as the "Longford Pong" which, despite mitigation works carried out in recent years at the sewerage treatment plant and JBS abattoir, now affects a broader area of Longford and has not improved".

Officer Comment:

Council officers acknowledge the community's ongoing concerns regarding the intermittent odour in Longford. Council is currently investigating the feasibility of implementing a continuous air quality monitoring system and proposing cooperation with the EPA and other stakeholders.

Background:

Discussion regarding Longford odour and its worsening effect on Longford living standards. Cr Matthew Brooks noted that a delegation from NMC was due to tour the JBS abattoir.

8.4 PETITIONS

PURPOSE OF REPORT

In accordance with the Vision, Mission and Values of Council as identified in the *Council's Strategic Plan 2021-2027* and the *Local Government Act 1993, S57-S60*, provision is made for Council to receive petitions tabled at the Council Meeting.

OFFICER'S COMMENT

In relation to the receipt of petitions, the following provisions of the *Local Government Act 1993*, Part 6 - Petitions, polls and public meetings, S57 and S58, should be noted:

Section 57. Petitions

[Section 57 Substituted by No. 8 of 2005, s. 46, Applied:01 Jul 2005]

- (1) A person may lodge a petition with a council by presenting it to a councillor or the general manager.
- (2) A person lodging a petition is to ensure that the petition contains
 - (a) a clear and concise statement identifying the subject matter and the action requested; and
 - (b in the case of a paper petition, a heading on each page indicating the subject matter; and
 - (c) in the case of a paper petition, a brief statement on each page of the subject matter and the action requested; and
 - (d) a statement specifying the number of signatories; and
 - (e) at the end of the petition
 - (i) in the case of a paper petition, the full name, address and signature of the person lodging the petition; and
 - (ii) in the case of an electronic petition, the full name and address of the person lodging the petition and a statement by that person certifying that the statement of the subject matter and the action requested, as set out at the beginning of the petition, has not been changed.
- (3) In this section –

electronic petition means a petition where the petition is created and circulated electronically and the signatories have added their details by electronic means;

paper petition means a petition where the petition is created on paper which is then circulated and to which the signatories have added their details directly onto the paper;

petition means a paper petition or electronic petition;

signatory means -

- (a) in the case of a paper petition, a person who has added his or her details to the paper petition and signed the petition; and
- (b) in the case of an electronic petition, a person who has added his or her details to the electronic petition.

58. Tabling petition

- (1) A councillor who has been presented with a petition is to
 - (a)
 - (b) forward it to the general manager within 7 days after receiving it.
- (2) A general manager who has been presented with a petition or receives a petition under subsection (1)(b) is to table the petition at the next ordinary meeting of the council.
- (3) A petition is not to be tabled if -
 - (a) it does not comply with section 57; or
 - (b) it is defamatory; or
 - (c) any action it proposes is unlawful.
- (4) The general manager is to advise the lodger of a petition that is not tabled the reason for not tabling it within 21 days after lodgement.

8.6 132 & 337 CERTIFICATES ISSUED

In relation to the issue of 132 and 337 certificates, the following provisions of the *Local Government Act 1993*, Section 132 and Section 337, should be noted:

S132. Certificate of liabilities

- (1) A person referred to in subsection (2) may apply to the general manager for a certificate stating—
 - (a) the amount of any liability for rates, whether due or not on the land and outstanding interest or penalty payable in relation to the land;
 - (b) any amount received on account of rates that is held in credit against future liabilities for rates in relation to the land; and
 - (c) the amount of any charge on the land recoverable by the council.

S337. Council land information certificate

- (1) A person may apply in writing to the general manager for a certificate in respect of information relating to land specified and clearly identified in the application.
- (2) The general manager, on receipt of an application made in accordance with <u>subsection (1)</u>, is to issue a certificate in the prescribed form with answers to prescribed questions that are attached to the certificate.
- (3) A certificate under <u>subsection (2)</u> relates only to information that the council has on record as at the date of issue of the certificate.
- (4) A prescribed fee is payable in respect of the issue of a certificate.
- (5) The general manager, on request, may provide in or with the certificate any other information or document relating to the land that the general manager considers relevant.
- (6) A council does not incur any liability in respect of any information provided in good faith from sources external to the council.
- (7) A person, with the consent of the occupier or owner of specified land, may request in writing to the general manager that an inspection be carried out of that land to obtain supplementary information relevant to that land.
- (8) If the general manager agrees to a request under <u>subsection (5)</u> or <u>(7)</u>, the general manager may impose any reasonable charges and costs incurred.
- (9) In this section -

land includes -

- (a) any buildings and other structures permanently fixed to land; and
- (b) land covered with water; and
- (c) water covering land; and
- (d) any estate, interest, easement, privilege or right in or over land.

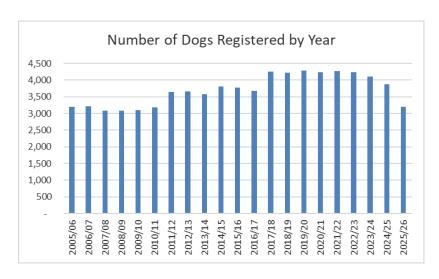

All Food premises are due for at least one inspection from 1 July of each year. The number of inspections in the table above is the total premises are due for at least one inspection from 1 July of each year. The number of inspections in the table above is the total number carried out since 1 July in each financial year.

Inspections are conducted according to a risk-based assessment and cover all aspects of food storage, handling and preparation.

A total of 35 criteria are assessed for either compliance, non-compliance or serious non-compliance.

The Tasmanian Department of Health has produced a legal framework, the Food Business Risk-Classification System (RCS), to classify food premises for registration and notification purposes under the *Food Act 2003*.

Actions, including follow-up inspections, are taken according to the outcome of inspections, the RCS can be used to prioritise the inspection of food businesses, with inspection frequency being increased for high risk classified food premises. In addition, poorly performing food premises would be inspected more frequently.

For those enquiring about opening a food business i.e. Home based food business, officers inspect the premises and after a risk assessment determine whether a food licence is to be issued.



The following is applicable regarding food business registrations:

- A Food Business Application is to be completed and lodged with Council each year (Financial) Sections 84 or 87 or 89 of the Food
 Act.
- Council conducts a desk top assessment of the application in accordance with the Food Business Risk Classification System issued by Tasmanian Department of Health. The assessment is based on the information provided by the applicant.
- Based on the Risk assessed an invoice is issued to the applicant.
- Upon receipt of payment Council issues a Certificate of Registration.
- Council conducts an inspection of the premises during their operation to ensure compliance with the *Food Act* and Regulations and the Food Standards Code. The business is also assessed in line with their Risk Classification.
- Further inspections may be required to ensure any non-compliance issued have been addressed.

On-site Wastewater Assessments are completed after receiving a system design report from a consultant which basically determines what type of sewage system is required (septic or AWTS) and the method of distributing the sewage effluent on site based on AS1547.

A place of assembly is required for any mass outdoor public event. This means an event with over 1000 people for 2 hours or more. It may be any performance, exhibition, circus, festival, food festival, pageant, regatta, sports event, dance or publicly advertised lecture.

Notifiable Disease investigations are carried out by Council's Environmental Health Officer at the request of the Department of Health. Investigations typically relate to cases of food borne illness. While some investigations are inconclusive others can be linked to other cases and outbreaks within Tasmania and across Australia. Under the Public Health Act 1997, investigations are confidential.

2 Setbacks

Notwithstanding condition 1, the setback of each sculpture from the boundaries of the site (title boundary) must be a minimum of 5m.

1 INTRODUCTION

This report assesses an application for 10 new sculptural structures (Species Hotels) classified under the natural and cultural values management use class against the relevant provisions of the *Tasmanian Planning Scheme – Northern Midlands* (SPP version 13 effective 16 July 2025 and LPS version: 15 effective from 30 July 2025). The structures incorporate nesting boxes for birds, bats and other native animals and the purpose of the project is to provide habitats in landscapes that are currently lacking in good habitat for native animals.

2 STATUTORY REQUIREMENTS

Council acts as a Planning Authority for the assessment of this application under the Land Use Planning and Approvals Act 1993 (the Act). Council as the Planning Authority must determine the application for a permit pursuant to Section 51(2) of the Act and 6.10 of the Tasmanian Planning Scheme – Northern Midlands (the Scheme).

The proposal is an application pursuant to section 57 of the Act (i.e., a discretionary application). Determination of the application is a statutory obligation. In determining an application, the Planning Authority must take into consideration:

- a) all applicable standards and requirements in this planning scheme; and
- any representations received pursuant to and in conformity with section 57(5) of the Act.

In the case of the exercise of discretion to refuse or approve the application, items a) and b) above must be considered only as far as each matter is relevant to the particular discretion being exercised.

All applicable standards and requirements in this planning scheme



Compliance with the applicable standards consists of complying with the Acceptable Solution or satisfying the Performance Criteria for that standard. Where an application complies with an Acceptable Solution, the corresponding Performance Criteria cannot be considered. Where an application does not comply with an Acceptable Solution, the application must be assessed against the corresponding Performance Criteria. An assessment of the applicable standards pertaining to this application is included in section 5 of this report.

Any representations received pursuant to and in conformity with section 57(5) of the Act.

The council, as the Planning Authority, is obliged to consider the views raised by the community by way of representation received during the public notification period. However, decisions made by the Planning Authority must be in accordance with the Act and the planning scheme. This means that Council as the Planning Authority can only consider matters raised in representations that insofar as those matters are relevant to the particular discretion being exercised. Consideration of matters that are not relevant to the particular discretion being exercised risks a decision being made that cannot stand up to challenge through the Tasmanian Civil and Administrative Tribunal. An assessment of the representations is included in section 5.5 of this report.

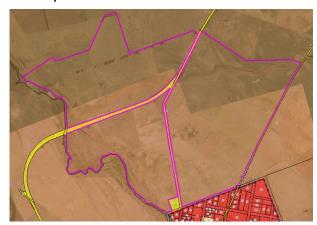

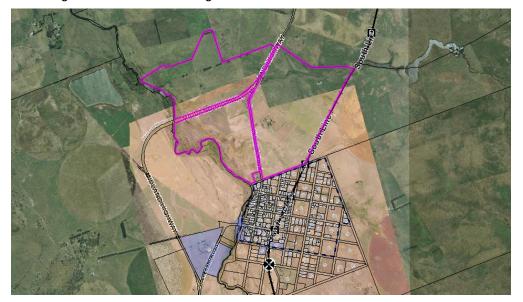


Zone Map

Overall, the proposed development avoids or minimise adverse impacts on the Macquarie River (the natural asset) and complies with the performance criteria.

1 INTRODUCTION

This report assesses an application to amend planning permit PLN-25-0109 (change of use from Visitor Accommodation and single dwelling to workers accommodation (communal residences)) by deleting the requirement for sealed driveway and parking areas to be drained to the public stormwater system.

2 STATUTORY REQUIREMENTS

Council acts as a Planning Authority for the assessment of this application under the Land Use Planning and Approvals Act 1993 (the Act).

The proposal is a request pursuant to section 56 of the *Land Use Planning & Approvals Act 1993* (i.e., amendments to permits). The original application was made pursuant to section 57 of the *Land Use Planning & Approvals Act 1993* (i.e., a discretionary application).

56. Minor amendments of permits issued by a planning authority

(1) The owner of land, or a person with the consent of the owner, may request the planning authority in writing to amend a permit which applies to that land and which is a permit issued by the planning authority.

5 PLANNING SCHEME ASSESSMENT

5.1 Reason for Amendment

The request is to delete conditions 2, 3, and 7 reproduced below:

- 2 PLANS REQUIRED
- 2.1 Within 2 months of the date of this permit:
- Plans showing the sealing and drainage to Council's stormwater main of all parking, access ways, manoeuvring and circulation spaces must be provided to the approval of the General Manager.
- The applicant must provide a design and plans from a suitably qualified engineer for underground stormwater drainage by gravity to Council's stormwater main located adjacent to 111A/113 Main Street including extension of the main in Main Street to collect stormwater from the driveway. The system must connect through properly-jointed pipes to the stormwater main, inter-allotment drainage or other lawful point of discharge to the satisfaction of the Plumbing inspector.
- 2.2 When approved, the plans required above will be endorsed and form part of this permit.

3 SEALING OF DRIVEWAY

Works in accordance with the plans required by condition 2 must be completed within 2 months of those plans being endorsed, or further time approved by the General Manager in writing.

7 Extension of the stormwater main must be completed within 2 months of the plans required by condition 2 being endorsed, or further time approved by the General Manager in writing.

The request is also to amend condition 1 to refer to new plans which remove references to draining the existing gravel driveway to the stormwater system and reduce the number of parking spaces from 10 to 8.

The applicant advises as follows.

A level survey and inspection of the site regarding access and services confirms:

- The existing buildings are all built up and their stormwater and sewer are drained to the infrastructure in Main Street. Sewer drains to the sewer main and stormwater drains to an existing grated pit and then 3 existing kerb outlets.
- The existing crossover & apron is concrete and the internal driveway is sealed for approximately 45 metres to the lot proper – it requires some minor repair of potholes; the remaining internal driveways and carparking areas are gravel.
- The existing stormwater drainage works and the kerb connections then drain along the kerb to the north to a side
 entry pit. The Council side entry pit and stormwater main crossing the road has little to no cover and would not meet
 LGAT standards. Refer to photo attached showing the pipe obvert above road seal height.



• It would be impossible to drain all of the site carparking to the stormwater system due to the levels of the site and very shallow nature of the stormwater system. It does not allow for a pipe diameter, let alone any cove.

Due to the planning application being for a use change only and no development is required or proposed, it makes sense to leave the driveway and stormwater as per the status quo. To seal the whole driveway and car parking areas would create impervious surfaces that cannot be drained.

Can we please request council consider an amendment to the permit to remove all conditions regarding works to stormwater, driveway and parking areas as the infrastructure all exists, aside from minor repairs to that portion of the existing sealed driveway.

It is evident that the parking, access ways, manoeuvring and circulation spaces are readily identifiable and constructed so that they are useable in all weather conditions. It is also evident that debris is being transported from the site onto Main Street (refer to site photographs). An area of the existing driveway (approximately a 45m length of the access strip) shows evidence it was once a sealed driveway. Due to the broken up surface of this portion of the driveway, evidence of pot holes and debris being transported onto Main Street, it is recommended a condition be placed on any amended permit that will require upgrades/maintenance to ensure that this portion of the driveway is returned to a sealed surface in accordance with the acceptable solution for this portion. As the surface of this portion of the driveway will be returned to a condition similar to that previously on site, it is not envisaged that the surface level will be such that there will be any increase or change to existing stormwater drainage. The balance of the internal driveways and carparking areas will remain as gravel. It is therefore recommended that the driveway be re-sealed for the portion shown as



per the amended plans submitted. There is no standard that this must be constructed to i.e. concrete, 2-coat spray-seal, or asphalt, that is a matter for consideration of ongoing maintenance and costs for the proponent, as long as it is sealed with a material to restrict abrasion from traffic and minimise entry of water to the pavement, the acceptable solution for this portion of the driveway will be met. Stormwater drainage is existing, no further requirements for stormwater required.

5.2 S.56 LUPAA

The planning authority may amend the permit if it is satisfied that the amendment –

(aa) is not an amendment of a condition or restriction, specified in the permit, that is required, imposed or amended by the Appeal Tribunal;

Comment: The permit was not decided by appeal.

(a) does not change the effect of a condition or restriction, specified in the permit, that is required, imposed or amended by the Appeal Tribunal;

Comment: The permit was not decided by appeal.

(b) will not cause an increase in detriment to any person;

<u>Comment</u>: It is considered that the amendment will not cause an increase in detriment to any person as discussed in this report.

(c) does not change the use or development for which the permit was issued other than a minor change to the description of the use or development.

Comment: The amendment does not change the use or development.

5.3 REFERRALS

The amendment request did not require any referrals.

5.4 REPRESENTATIONS

Notice of the original application was given in accordance with Section 57 of the Act. One representation was received. However, the applicant did not grant an extension of time to allow the application to be decided at a Council meeting. The application was therefore decided under delegation. The representation did not raise concerns regarding the surface of the driveway, access and parking areas. The representor and all adjoining property owners and occupiers will be able to appeal the amended permit, if approved.

5.5 OBJECTIVES OF THE LAND USE PLANNING AND APPROVALS ACT 1993

- (f) to promote the health and wellbeing of all Tasmanians and visitors to Tasmania by ensuring a pleasant, efficient and safe environment for working, living and recreation; and
- (g) to conserve those buildings, areas or other places which are of scientific, aesthetic, architectural or historical interest, or otherwise of special cultural value; and
- (h) to protect public infrastructure and other assets and enable the orderly provision and co-ordination of public utilities and other facilities for the benefit of the community; and
- (i) to provide a planning framework which fully considers land capability.

The proposal is consistent with the objectives of the Land Use Planning and Approvals Act 1993.

Approval of the application subject to conditions, or refusal with reasons for refusal detailed. When deciding whether to include conditions in a permit, the planning authority may consider:

- a) all applicable standards and requirements in this planning scheme; and
- b) any representations received pursuant to and in conformity with section 57(5) of the Act, but only insofar as each such matter is relevant to the **particular discretion** being exercised.

In accordance with 6.11.2 of the Scheme, conditions and restrictions imposed by the planning authority on a permit may include:

- a) requirements that specific acts be done to the satisfaction of the planning authority;
- b) staging of a use or development, including timetables for commencing and completing stages;
- c) the order in which parts of the use or development can be commenced;
- d) limitations on the life of the permit;
- e) requirements to modify the development in accordance with predetermined triggers, criteria or events;
- f) construction or traffic management; and
- g) erosion, and stormwater volume and quality controls.

The test for determining the validity of a condition imposed on a permit was originally considered in *Newbury District Council v Secretary of State for the Environment [1981] AC 578 and subsequently affirmed by the High Court in Western Australian Planning Commission v Temwood Holdings Pty Ltd (2004) 221 CLR 30, [57] (McHugh J).*

The proposed conditions of approval have been drafted based on the above principles in that they:

- (i) are for a planning purpose and not for an ulterior purpose; and
- (ii) fairly and reasonably relate to the proposed development; and
- (iii) are not so unreasonable that no reasonable planning authority could have imposed them.

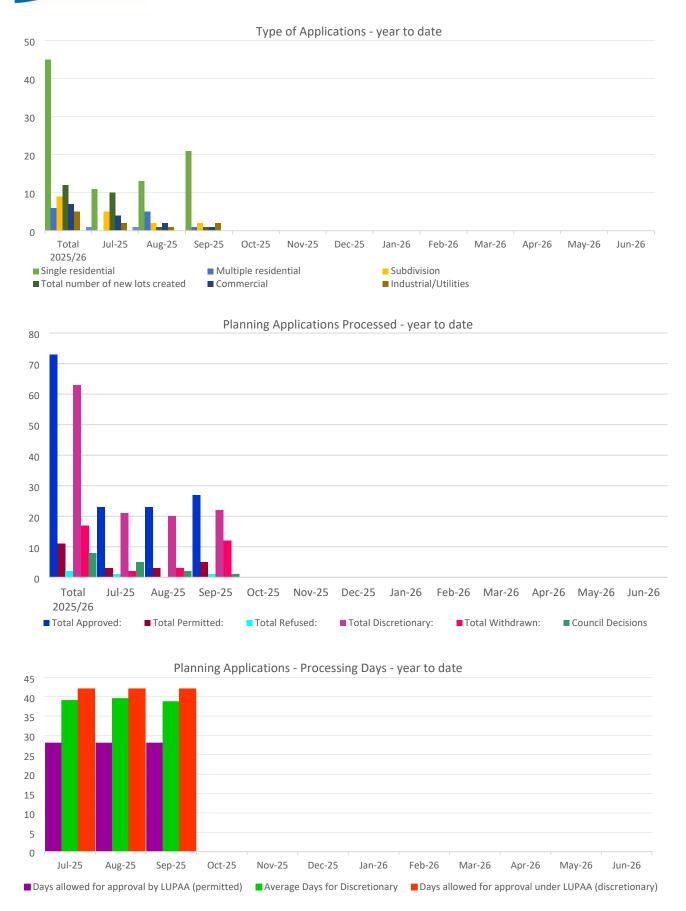

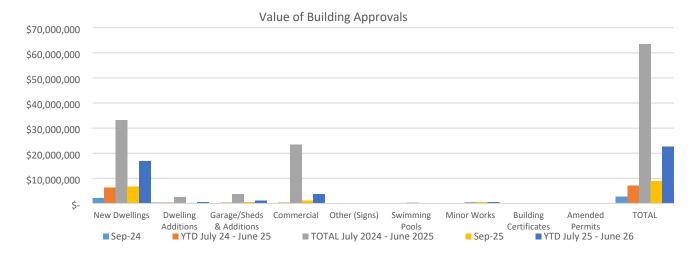

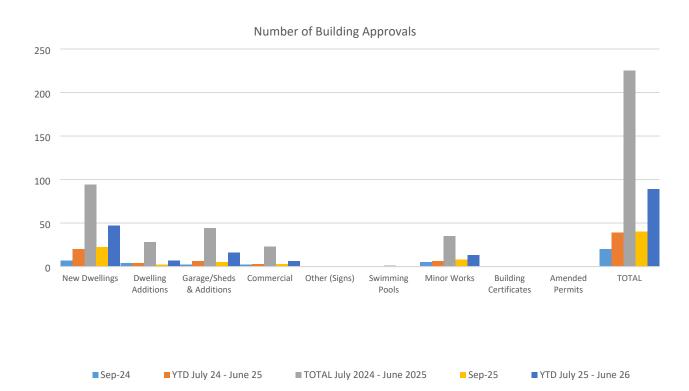

RECOMMENDATION

1 PURPOSE OF REPORT

It is recommended that Council adopt the amendment to the Work, Health and Safety and Employee Wellbeing policy to provide for the waiver of the Annual Enrolment Fee for Employees who have children enrolled at a Council childcare service.

2 INTRODUCTION/BACKGROUND

Council currently charges an annual enrolment fee of \$30 per child for families accessing its childcare services. This fee applies uniformly, including to Council employees who utilise these services for their own children.

The proposed amendment seeks to waive this fee for Council employees, recognising their contribution to the organisation and promoting a family-friendly workplace. The waiver would apply only to employees with children enrolled in Council-operated childcare centres.

The NMC Workforce Plan 2025-2029, endorsed by Council in November 2024, identifies key strategies to retain and attract qualified staff, especially in roles experiencing skill shortages such as childcare educators. The plan highlights retention challenges due to market salary gaps and cost-of-living pressures, particularly for staff commuting from outside the municipality.

The proposed fee waiver directly supports these strategies by enhancing the Employee Value Proposition (EVP) for current and prospective staff, and reducing financial barriers for employees with children in Council childcare. This initiative complements broader efforts outlined in the Workforce Plan to improve retention and recruitment outcomes, particularly in early childhood education roles.

1 PURPOSE OF REPORT

The purpose of this report is to outline the Northern Midlands Council's submission to the Department of Premier and Cabinet regarding the proposed reforms to councillor numbers and allowances, as detailed in the Discussion Paper - Reforms to Councillor Numbers and Allowances. This report aims to summarize the Council's position, highlight key concerns, and provide recommendations in response to the targeted amendments to the *Local Government Act 1993*.

2 INTRODUCTION/BACKGROUND

The Tasmanian Government's Local Government Reform Program (2024–2026) includes targeted amendments to the Local Government Act 1993, focusing on councillor numbers and allowances. The reforms are part of a broader agenda to enhance governance, representation, and financial sustainability within local councils.

The reforms are intended to:

- Reduce the total number of councillors statewide from 263 to 203.
- Increase councillor allowances by an average of 14.25%, funded by savings from fewer councillors.
- Align councillor numbers and pay with council responsibilities, using metrics such as population, development activity, infrastructure, and urbanisation.
- Establish regular four-yearly reviews and consider additional support measures, such as mandatory superannuation payments.

The Northern Midlands Council does not support a reduction in the number of councillors. The Council believes that reducing councillor numbers risks diminishing the diversity of views and backgrounds represented, particularly in small communities where conflicts of interest are more likely. Recent experience has shown that with fewer councillors, maintaining a quorum and effective decision-making becomes challenging.

Councillors expressed concerns about workload and representation if Councillor numbers were decreased. It was felt that it would see an increase in individual workloads, potentially leading to delays, lack of responsiveness, and reduced capacity to serve municipal residents. The Council felt that the proposal does not address the real challenges facing local government and may be perceived as a step towards amalgamation, undermining trust and transparency.

The Council raised questions that the claim that the reforms will be cost neutral. While the discussion paper asserts that savings from fewer councillors will fund increased allowances, detailed tables show that only some councils will achieve net savings. Others may face increased costs due to allowance and progression or historical reductions in numbers. The



Council requests further transparency and modelling to demonstrate how cost neutrality will be achieved across all councils.

The Council expressed concern about the slow implementation of other important reforms, such as compulsory councillor education, flexible meeting attendance, paid parental leave, increased superannuation, and stronger sanctions for misconduct. The Council urges the Government to implement these complementary reforms more quickly to enhance the effectiveness and appeal of local government service.

While Northern Midlands Council appreciates the opportunity to provide feedback on the proposed reforms. The Council urges the Government to reconsider the reduction in councillor numbers and focus on reforms that genuinely strengthen local government, ensure transparency, and support effective community representation.

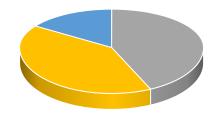

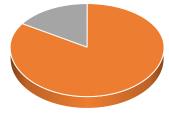

Total Investments by Rating (Standard & Poor's)

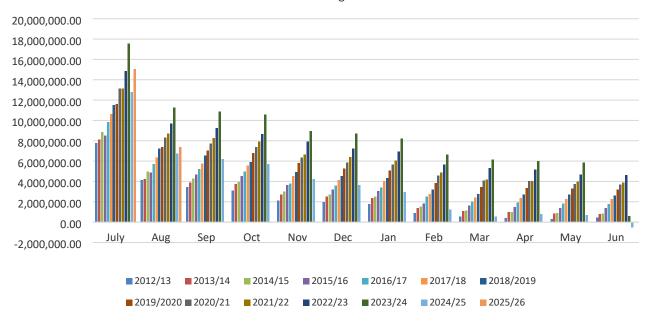

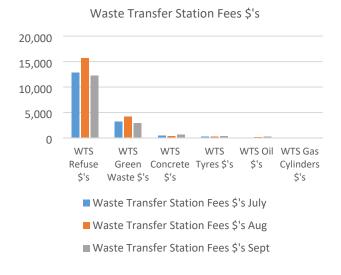

- Refuse will be charged at \$202.00 per tonne, with a minimum charge of \$8.00 for loads up to 0.04 tonnes.
- Green waste will be charged at \$130.00 per tonne, with a minimum charge of \$5.00 for loads up to 0.04 tonnes.
- Inert materials such as concrete and masonry will be charged at \$130.00 per tonne, with a minimum charge of \$5.00 for loads up to 0.04 tonnes.
- Waste oil will be charged \$1.50 per litre.
- Steel will continue to be accepted free of charge.

b) Accept that the Evandale Waste Transfer Station will be limited to receive waste only from the Evandale/Nile District.

1 PURPOSE OF REPORT

As Northern Midlands Council prepares for the implementation of weighbridges, officers have undertaken a thorough review of Council's waste management pricing model. This reassessment has led to the development of updated pricing structures for all waste categories, which are designed to better reflect the actual costs incurred and to ensure financial sustainability moving forward. Finally, it has been proposed that the Evandale Waste Transfer Station will now accept waste only from properties within the Evandale and Nile Districts. This adjustment supports better site management and ensures services remain focused on the local community.

2 INTRODUCTION/BACKGROUND

Between July and September 2025, the Council charged an average of \$136 per tonne for refuse disposal. To illustrate the financial impact, the figures from July 2025 are provided below.

In July, the total revenue collected from refuse takings was \$9,474.00. During the same month, the Council was charged for refuse disposal based on 59.24 tonnes at a rate of \$202.00 per tonne, resulting in a disposal cost of \$11,966.48. In addition to this, the Council incurred a levy tax of \$2,468.68, a cartage fee of \$4,096.44, and a bin hire cost of \$1,186.60. These additional expenses brought the total charges for July to \$19,718.20.

The Council acknowledges that previous pricing methods, based on trailer size, bag loads, or estimated cubic meterage, have led to confusion and conflict between the public and waste attendants. These methods often relied on estimates rather than precise measurements, resulting in frustration and disagreement.

To resolve these issues, all future pricing will be calculated by the kilogram. This change will eliminate guesswork and ensure a more accurate and consistent pricing structure. Contractors, who charge the public for green waste disposal, etc have also faced similar challenges as previously, the Council charged these contractors based on trailer size. With the new weighbridge system, charges will now be based on weight, promoting fairness and transparency.

To address the rising costs and ensure a fairer system for the community, the Council has implemented weighbridges and developed a revised pricing structure for the Longford Waste Transfer Station. This new structure will take effect from 01 December 2025.

Under the revised pricing:

- Refuse will be charged at \$202.00 per tonne, with a minimum charge of \$8.00 for loads up to 0.04 tonnes.
- Green waste will be charged at \$130.00 per tonne, with a minimum charge of \$5.00 for loads up to 0.04 tonnes.
- Inert materials such as concrete and masonry will be charged at \$130.00 per tonne, with a minimum charge of \$5.00 for loads up to 0.04 tonnes.
- Waste oil will be charged \$1.50 per litre.
- Steel will continue to be accepted free of charge.



Council waste procedures are also being updated. Previously, green waste from activities such as tree trimming in Longford were taken to the Waste Station without any charge to the Council. Similarly, concrete rubble from footpath replacements was dumped at the Waste Station at no cost. Moving forward, all Council vehicles will be weighed, and disposal costs will be charged back to the specific job number rather than the Waste Station. Costs associated with mulching or crushing will also be allocated to the relevant job number.

Finally, it has been proposed that the Evandale Waste Transfer Station will now accept waste only from properties within the Evandale and Nile Districts. This adjustment supports better site management and ensures services remain focused on the local community.

Residents outside the designated area should use alternative waste facilities appropriate to their location.

Fees and charges of Campbell Town and Evandale Waste Transfer Stations will be reviewed and discussed in the future.

6 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The new weighbridge-based pricing at Longford Waste Transfer Station will improve financial sustainability by charging refuse and green waste by weight (\$202/tonne and \$130/tonne, respectively), replacing less accurate volume-based fees. This change addresses previous revenue shortfalls, ensures costs are recovered, and increases transparency for both the community and Council operations.



7 RISK ISSUES

If the recommendations in the report are not adopted, the Council risks ongoing financial losses, as current disposal costs and associated fees have already exceeded revenue. Continuing with the old pricing model may also lead to ongoing confusion and disputes at the waste transfer station, reducing operational efficiency and customer satisfaction the introduction of the weighbridges will mean this does not occur. Additionally, failing to allocate disposal costs accurately to Council operations could undermine effective budgeting and resource management.

11 OFFICER'S COMMENTS/CONCLUSION

The implementation of weighbridges marks a significant step forward in Northern Midlands Council's commitment to improving waste management practices. Following a comprehensive review of the existing pricing model, Council officers have developed updated pricing structures that more accurately reflect the true costs of waste disposal.

Under the revised pricing:

- Refuse will be charged at \$202.00 per tonne, with a minimum charge of \$8.00 for loads up to 0.04 tonnes.
- Green waste will be charged at \$130.00 per tonne, with a minimum charge of \$5.00 for loads up to 0.04 tonnes
- Inert materials such as concrete and masonry will be charged at \$130.00 per tonne, with a minimum charge of \$5.00 for loads up to 0.04 tonnes.
- Waste oil will be charged \$1.50 per litre.
- Steel will continue to be accepted free of charge.

These changes are designed to promote transparency, ensure financial sustainability, and support the responsible management of waste across all categories. As the new system is rolled out, Council remains focused on delivering efficient, equitable, and environmentally sound services to the community.

16.1 PROPOSED SPEED LIMIT REDUCTION: HOBART ROAD - KERRY LODGE BRIDGE TO YOUNGTOWN MUNICIPAL BOUNDARY

RECOMMENDATION

That Council request the Transport Commissioner to consider reducing the speed limit on Hobart Road from 80km/h to 60km/h from Kerry Lodge Bridge to the Youngtown Municipal boundary.

1 PURPOSE OF REPORT

The purpose of this report is for Council to consider a reduction of the speed limit on Hobart Road from 80km/h to 60 km/h form Kerry Lodge Bridge to the Youngtown Municipal boundary in connection with soon to commence Shared Pathway for that area.

2 INTRODUCTION/BACKGROUND

The existing speed limit along Hobart Road is 100 km/h, reducing to 80 km/h at Kerry Lodge Bridge. It further decreases to 60 km/h at the Northern Midlands Council Municipal boundary at Youngtown.

Council is nearing the commencement of Stage one (1) of the Hobart Road Shared Pathway Project. This stage begins at the municipal boundary with the City of Launceston at Youngtown and extends south along Hobart Road. Where feasible, the pathway will be separated from the roadway within Councils Road reserve to enhance safety and user experience.

For most of stage one (1), the shared pathway is adjoined to the road and separated by kerb and channel. A bicycle barrier is also incorporated in the design. Decreasing the speed in this area would create a safer environment for all users.

Future stages of the project will see the pathway continue within the Department of State Growth's road reserve, subject to their approval. These stages aim to connect seamlessly with the existing shared pathway at Breadalbane, completing a key active transport link within the region.

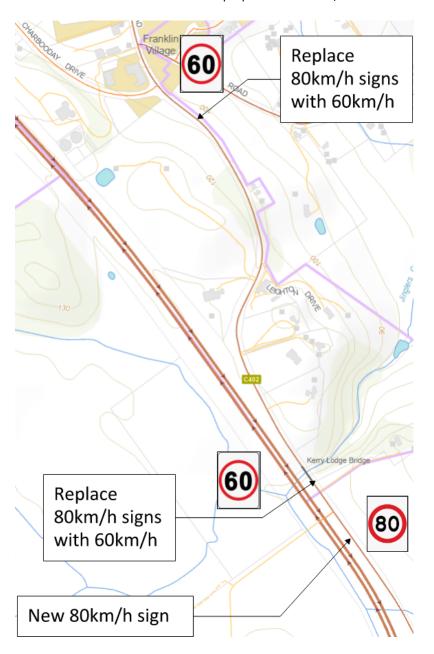
The proposed speed reduction over the (approximately)1km distance would increase travel time by 15 seconds if travelling at the limit.

Speed limits in Tasmania are the responsibility of the Department of State Growth, and any changes need to be approved by the Transport Commissioner. Council may request the Transport Commissioner to review speed limits.

7 RISK ISSUES

Research consistently shows that reducing speed limits significantly lowers the risk and severity of crashes. A reduction of 20 km/h can greatly improve safety outcomes, particularly for vulnerable road users such as pedestrians and cyclists. Lower speeds increase driver reaction time and reduce stopping distances, which is especially important in areas with increased activity from shared pathway users and turning vehicles.

8 CONSULTATION WITH STATE GOVERNMENT

Discussions with the Department of State Growth regarding this section of road have previously taken place. The speed limit reduction in the area was considered in consultation with State Growth and based on recommendations from a Traffic Engineer as part of a development approval issued in 2016.

At that time, Traffic Officer at DSG provided the following response:

"On review we are not supportive of lowering the regulatory speed limit to 60km/h through this section. Given the road environment, it is unlikely to be credible to drivers over the entire length.

It is noted that the access is within the reverse curve section where the geometry restricts vehicle speeds and the approaches are signed with 65km/h advisory speeds. There is also the turn lane provided and assuming majority of traffic



will be right in and left out from and to the City the mitigation of the advisory speed and concealed entrance signage is considered satisfactory"

There was no proposed shared pathway as part of that development back in 2016.

9 COMMUNITY CONSULTATION

Requests from local businesses which operate in this section of road have been received.

10 OPTIONS FOR COUNCIL TO CONSIDER

- 1. Reduce the speed limit from 80km/h to 60km/h.
- 2. Do not reduce the speed limit and leave the limit on this section of road to at 80km/h.
- 3. Propose an alternative speed limit for this section of road.

11 OFFICER'S COMMENTS/CONCLUSION

With the anticipated increase in pedestrian and cyclist activity resulting from the new shared pathway, and concerns raised regarding vehicle movements, particularly turning into local businesses, a reduction in speed limits along Hobart Road would contribute to a safer environment for all road users. Lower speeds improve reaction times and reduce the severity of potential incidents, supporting Councils commitment to promoting active transport and public safety.

While the Department of State Growth did not support a speed limit reduction in this area during discussions held in 2016, the evolving inclusion of pedestrian infrastructure warrants a renewed consideration of traffic conditions as part of Councils due diligence to ensure safety.
