



TRANSLINK INTERMODAL FACILITY

The TRANSLink Intermodal Facility (TIF) is a proposed intermodal facility in or adjacent to the TRANSLink Industrial Estate, which aims to integrate rail, road and air freight transports modes with logistical and value-adding industrial activities.

The proposed TRANSLink Intermodal Facility will enable efficient transfer of goods from one mode of transport to another, significantly enhancing access to interstate and overseas markets, particularly for perishable goods.

Northern Tasmania Development Corporation (NTDC) have partnered with the Northern Midlands Council to deliver this project.

Feasibility study and business case update – November 2025

NTDC has engaged Cushman & Wakefield to undertake the feasibility study for this project, and to assist with the development of the business case.

This Business Case is seeking to assess the feasibility and the strategic merit of a new intermodal freight facility in the Northern Tasmania region. It provides a structured framework to guide future investment decisions and ensure alignment with regional and state priorities.

The scope includes:

- assessing the viability of a contestable freight terminal to support efficient and integrated freight movement
- identifying and evaluation of potential site locations, including the selection of a preferred site

- exploring commercial and tenancy arrangements to support long term operations
- developing and analysis of a range of delivery and operating model options
- undertaking economic, financial and risk assessments to inform decision making and a preferred scope and option
- engaging with market participants to understand operator and developer capacity to inform market strategy
- outlining implementation pathways, governance arrangements and funding operations.

Together, these components provide a comprehensive basis for determining the strategic, commercial and operational case for investment in the project.

Investment Logic Mapping

As part of their engagement, Cushman & Wakefield are facilitating an Investment Logic Map (ILM) process.

This process is in accordance with the Department of Treasury and Finance (Victoria) Investment Management Standards (IMS) and is a structured process used to support agencies and organisations in shaping an investment need and proposal.

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Investment Logic Mapping (continued)

The process generally consists of three separate workshops – one to define the problem, one to explore the benefits of the proposed project or solution, and one to determine the best response and solution to the problem a project is designed to solve.

The first workshop, which focused on defining the problem, was held in October 2025. The workshop was attended by representatives from City of Launceston, Department of State Growth, Infrastructure Tasmania, Launceston Chamber of Commerce, Northern Midlands Council, Office of the Coordinator General, TasPorts and TasRail.



Unlocking Tasmania's Logistics & Industrial Potential: Strategic Briefing

In early December 2025, Cushman & Wakefield, in partnership with the Northern Tasmania Development Corporation and Northern Midlands Council, facilitated a strategic briefing session focused on unlocking Tasmania's logistics and industrial potential.

Presented by Luke Crawford, Head of Logistics and Industrial Research and attended by approximately 50 stakeholder representatives, the presentation provided an overview of the current state of play for both Tasmania and Australia in both the industrial and logistics industries and gave an insight into what challenges operators are facing.

The briefing also shared some key learnings from other intermodal facilities around Australia, including the Moorebank Intermodal Precinct, which is currently under construction in New South Wales.

Key stakeholder engagement

As part of the development of this business case, NTDC and the project team has undertaken extensive stakeholder engagement to ensure that the project and the business case respond to the needs, priorities and expectations of its diverse user base.
